# **ACADEMICS: Class of 2017**

Washburn High School enjoys a fairly unique and diverse demographic. As an urban high school, the class of 2017 enrollment has been fairly fluid the past four years.

Actual numbers from the class of 2016 help illustrate this:

- 365 = Class size at the end of the 1st Semester 9th grade
- 303 = Class size Graduation day, 2016
- 236 = Number of students continuously enrolled from 9th 12th Grade

When graduation rates are reported in the media, no credit is given for students leaving Washburn "on track" for graduation. Nor is any allowance given for students who transfer to Washburn who are not on track for graduation.

The graduation rates calculated for Washburn include special education students who choose not to graduate in order to enroll in transitional post-12th grade programs and students in the WRAP program who are not eligible for a diploma. Special education students represent 32% of the class of 2016. These students participate fully in the life of the school including the ACT test.


Here's what we know about the class of 2017:

- ACT Scores continue to trend up AND above State and National averages.
- Two students are recognized as National Merit Scholars.
- 10 students are International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma Candidates (trends illustrated below).
- Students are submitting more college applications:
  - o The University of Minnesota Twin Cities continues to be the top choice for the largest number of applicants, with the University of Wisconsin–Madison also running among the top 10.
  - o There's continued interest in liberal arts colleges with Augsburg, St. Thomas, Hamline, and Gustavus among the top 10 schools to which Washburn seniors applied.
  - o Outside of the five-state area, the top school receiving applications from Washburn students is the University of Colorado-Boulder.

#### International Baccalaureate (IB) Trends

With the introduction of IB in 2010, the number of diploma candidates and winners at Washburn has continued to climb. Actual diplomas for 2017 are not yet available.

#### **Spotlight Musical: Into The Woods**

Washburn's Spotlight Musical, "Into The Woods", was a fabulous production of Stephen Sondheim's musically-sophisticated, dark comedy. Eight performances were well attended by students, families, and community members. New Tech Director, Madeline Achen, joined Washburn for the spring semester and added her theater experience to the production. "It was a beautiful show and an amazing collaboration between all of the arts departments," said Director of Vocal Music and Fine Arts Coordinator Nancy Lee. The Hennepin Theatre Trust Spotlight Awards features performances from many talented theater programs will be held June 12 and 13 at the State Theatre. Washburn will perform an excerpt from Into the Woods on June 12.



#### **Choir Program Grows**

While at the fall choir concert for their granddaughter, Kathy and Wayne Urbaniak heard Ms. Nancy Lee talk about the need for risers and were moved to donate. With their generosity, Washburn purchased seven new risers that will hold 225 more choir students.



The Washburn Miller Voices, our 86 voice select choir, received a Division 1 Superior Rating at the State Large Group Choir Contest in March, which is the highest division and the highest score possible.



#### **Washburn Band Tours Kansas City**

The Washburn wind ensemble and jazz band students toured Kansas City, Missouri this spring. They played a few concerts, and worked with internationally known clinicians at the Conservatory at the University of Missouri Kansas City and Lee's Summit High School. The students also saw a jazz orchestra performance, toured an instrument shop to see how brass instruments are made and visited the Vine Jazz District. In 2018, the orchestra program will tour to Chicago.

#### **ATHLETICS**

Participation in WHS athletics continues to grow along with the rapid growth of enrollment.

**Wrestling** – The wrestling program had record numbers with 31 student-athletes. Sophomore Patrick Lockwood recorded his 100th win, finished the season 31-3 in his matches and made his third State appearance. Junior Sedrique Ametor made his second appearance at State; Senior Ethan Kiehm received the Minneapolis City Conference Wrestler of the Year Award and made his first appearance at State.

**Nordic Skiing -** The program grew to 66 skiers this year. Senior Austyn Kimbrell qualified for the State tournament.

**Alpine Skiing -** The Girls Alpine team had a solid season while the Boys team qualified for State for the first time in 41 years.

**Boys Basketball -** The Millers were led by Junior Terrell and Senior Cortez Adams who both received All-City Honors for the second straight year.



**Girls Basketball** – It was the first season under new head coach Mike Contreras. With only two seniors the future looks bright. Senior Jacqueline Boarman led the way receiving All-City Honors. She was also selected to play in the Inner City All Star Classic that will take place in May.

**Track & Field** - Nearly 170 students are participating this season, with an additional 30 in the Middle School program. Students are excited about the new pole vault pit which has been missing from the program for over 10 years. The team will be competing for its fifth straight boys and girls Conference Championship.

**Baseball -** With nearly 60 players, Washburn is fielding four teams for the third year in a row. The Varsity team hopes to make a strong bid for the City and Sectional Titles.

**Boys Tennis -** The boys tennis team has nearly 50 players on three teams. They are attempting to be the first ever Minneapolis city school to win six consecutive outright Conference and Twin City Championships.

**Girls Softball -** The team came back to beat Southwest 11-10 in an exciting game on April 28.

#### **DEBATE NEWS**

The Washburn Debate Team had an outstanding season this year on both the local and national circuits. Novice debaters consistently placed in the top handful of teams at each of the local tournaments. To end the season, Washburn had two teams (four students) qualify for the state tournament. Lily Endo and Luke Peichel took fourth place overall, and Grace Klage and Alex Dresdner placed second. Alex Dresdner and Lily Endo will be competing in the National Urban Debate League Finals in April.



#### MATH TEAM UPDATE

The Washburn Math Team made its first State Tournament appearance in the Minnesota State High School Mathematics League. Mr. Olson and Mr. Selvaag brought seven Washburn students and one Barton 8th grader to the tournament, competing against the top individuals/teams in the state. Senior Max Lindeman finished first in the individual scoring and received an invitation to compete at the State Tournament for individuals in April.





#### NATIONAL SIGNING DAY

On February 1, seven Washburn Student-Athletes signed National Letters of Intent to play college athletics. Washburn athletes represented nearly half of the 16 Minneapolis Public School students who signed letters of intent.

## TOM SWAIN: A FAITHFUL MILLER

Generations of Washburn students have climbed the 50th Street hill to attend Washburn. Tom Swain was part of that first generation. A graduate of the class of 1938 – just ten years after the school opened – Tom walked or biked up the hill from his home at 52nd Street and Clinton Avenue South to walk the halls of Washburn.

Archibald A. McQuarrie was the principal at the time, and he was known for setting high expectations for the school and students. "He was imposing," said Tom. "A real taskmaster." Tom experienced Principal McQuarrie's firm hand following a golf match. The Millers were tied for the city championship with West High School, and the deciding match was at the Meadowbrook Golf Course. With the first six players all golfing even, it was up to Tom to win the championship. But on the 18th hole, Tom lost the round and championship for his team. Disappointed and frustrated, he let go with a few coarse words. When a teacher reported it to Principal McQuarrie, Tom was suspended from school for three days for unsportsmanlike conduct.

Following his graduation, Tom had a full career working in the corporate sector, as well as serving as chief of staff to former Minnesota Governor Elmer L. Andersen, in various roles at the University of Minnesota and as mayor of Lilydale. He remains committed to making Minnesota a better place for its citizens.

Fifty years after his graduation, Tom helped found the Washburn High School Foundation. "I was privileged to have a great education, and there were some who couldn't have the same education," he said. The Foundation was created to ensure that the school has the resources to provide upcoming generations of students with the same quality of education he experienced. Tom remains devoted to the organization and the school. He keeps his class annual accessible and has lunch regularly with another classmate. Last fall, Tom joined other Foundation donors in tailgating before the football homecoming game. He remains a faithful Miller and countless students have benefitted from his devotion and leadership.
